Conclusion

"So what is God's agenda for the world and for our lives? The Bible reveals that his big purpose is found in Christ—in fact, Christ is the purpose, the rationale, the agenda. Passages such as Acts 17:22-31, Ephesians 1:1-10, Colossians 1:1-20 and Titus 2:11-14 reveal that God's agenda or purpose is history-long and worldwide. God has sent his Son Jesus into the world as a man to be the Christ and ruler of a new kingdom, to which redeemed and purified people from every nation (not just Israel) will belong. He has sent his Son to be the king of a new kingdom of God, a new creation, where there is no sin or pain or suffering or decay or death. Summary: God's agenda is to glorify Jesus the Christ by transferring forgiven rebels like us out of the domain of darkness and into his eternal kingdom.By so doing, He delivers His people - frees them from their bondage to sin, so they can now live under His loving rule without fear of condemnation: free to glorify and enjoy Him forever." - Tony Payne, The Course of Your Life
